# IN CONVERSATION WITH Ms. VASAVI MANDAVILLI, WE STRIVE BOARD MEMBER

Ms. Vasavi, a critical board member of We Strive club joined the organization in 2019 and has made a significant impact since then. She stood up her Public Speaking and Debate club in 2020 which became a phenomenal success during COVID time. Ms. Vasavi successfully ran eight clubs (both in-person and virtual) so far and mentored elementary, middle, and high school students. Another feather in the cap was the Summer Showcase that she led. It was attended by then Mayor TJ Cawley, Liz Johnson, and Steve Rao. All the students got an opportunity to display their talent in front of Morrisville Town's esteemed community leaders. #### When did you join We Strive?

I joined We Strive in late 2019.

#### What made you join We Strive?

I joined We Strive because I connected well with Mr.Suresh Vellanki's (Founder) vision, which was to empower our youth and teach them life skills outside the school and help them become successful in life and create an impact in the community that they live and eventually bigger impact beyond the community.

We are growing towards enabling our youth to consider community service impact and other things beyond what is taught in the school. That is something I connected with, and wanted to contribute whatever I can to aid the vision.

#### What impact do you feel you made through We Strive?

For the major part, my involvement with We Strive has been through the Public speaking and Debate clubs, geared towards elementary, middle school and high school children. We have run these clubs since the beginning of 2020, and we have done several classes. This program has significantly impacted youth in a positive way. Children who were nervous to talk publicly or on stage were mentored and given a platform to express their thoughts, overcome their stage fear, and be able to communicate with other kids and other adults publicly and not just that, but also expanded their thinking to read and then confidently speak about that. I think this program has been impactful in making children very confident and be successful with their school presentations.

#### In your opinion, how do you think We Strive impacted our community?

I think we Strive has had a huge impact on our community, at various levels because we introduce programs that are academically enriching, service oriented and help the kids learn several skills beyond academics.

With respect to giving back to the community, We Strive played a significant role, be it helping the underprivilege or helping develop leadership skills in the youth. The unique aspect of We Strive is that a lot of clubs are student-led and the Board of Directors, or the other adult leaders are there to just enable the youth. We have seen results of that,

kids coming out of the organization having gone through several personality development and character-building clubs gained confidence The leadership that they have shown in the community and what they are going to achieve later in life, it will stay with them for a long time and hopefully shape them to also be more responsible adults who give back to their community. So, I think the impact has been huge right now and will continue to be that way over the years as you guys grow up and go out into the world and help spread the same type of collaborative work.

#### Are there any other clubs led by you that we can share with our readers?

Apart from public speaking and supporting other youth leaders and volunteers, which is the main task, I have also led/contributed to the Summer Bash, the Annual event

#### What challenges did you face as you stood up these clubs?

Initially, I thought it was great. There was a lot of good turnout. The challenge for any of our volunteers who do this in their own time is to be able to find enough time amongst their other work and responsibilities. To be able to find the time and do a good job at it has always been a challenge. The second one being as the semesters or years went by, it has become harder to get the kids to attend in a disciplined way. Especially, sticking to the timelines has been one challenge recently.

#### Are there any upcoming classes?

I do not have a definite answer right now, but we are planning to have something finalized soon.

#### What is the experience overall from We strive so far?

Only positive, I am inspired constantly by the number of things that the kids do. It is so inspiring because it can get tiring during the weekend and every time, I see what is possible and read the success stories of We Strive kids who participate in activities in addition to the stress and work from their schools, house and community is extremely inspiring. It keeps me positive and energized. I feel that there is so much that can be done, a huge potential to do things if we set out mind to it.

#### What is your vision for We Strive?

My vision from we strive is huge. I know we have done a lot at the local scale at the community level and I know with time that we start making more inroads into really helping under privileged, which is one of the core visions of these drive is all of all of you guys kids, the adults, the family if you will that they really make a huge impact, um, you know, at a, at a community level state level, national level and ultimately global level. Right? I do see that as a possibility and with all hard work in time that it will happen, so I am excited to be part of that work.
